TEACHING EXPERIENCE:

The Illinois Mathematics and Science Academy (IL)

Instructor of History, 8/01 – Present: Full-time faculty position at Illinois' residential school for gifted students, grades 10 through 12. I conduct classes in Ancient World Religions and Philosophy, Conflict in World History, Modern Conflict, Insurgency and Terrorism, International Relations, Political Theory and World in the 20th Century. As part of IMSA's emphasis on personalized learning I also direct independent student research. Classes emphasize student participation and creativity, while minimizing lecture as the primary basis for learning. I am the advisor for the Indian Student Association (ISA). In 2010 I created and ran a year-long, school-wide academic seminar as an introduction to normative ethics (Aristotle, Kant, Rawls, etc.). The seminar meet once a month and made use of a cadre of student facilitators for breakout sessions. The program ended in 2019.

Aurora University (Aurora, IL)

Adjunct Instructor, 9/11 – 2016: I taught classes on American Government, Politics and Society, and Human Rights and Social Justice.

Northwestern University, (IL) Chicago Campus

Adjunct Instructor of History, 2003 - 2010: Instructor at Northwestern's School of Continuing Studies. I taught the classes: War and the Modern State, European Civilization, and United States History.

The Indiana Academy (IN)

Instructor of History, 8/96 - 6/01: Full-time faculty position at Ball State University's residential school for gifted 11th and 12th graders recruited from across the state. I conducted numerous classes in World History, Military History, American History, and Political Theory, with a heavy emphasis on student discussion and participation. I created the specific electives: War and the Modern State, The Second World War, and the American Civil War. I worked with numerous students on independent study topics that included the World Wars, Ancient Warfare, and military technology. In addition, I was the founder and faculty sponsor of the school's Outdoors Club.

Adjunct Instructor of History, 8/97 - 4/01: Taught courses for the history department and the School of Advanced Learning. The courses included World Civilizations: Pre-

History to 1700, World Civilizations: 1700 to the Present, Human Geography, and Political Theory. The classes represented a diverse mixture of full-time and continuing education students.

Adjunct Instructor of History, 7/97, 7/98-8/98 and 7/99-8/99: Taught a course in American Military History from the colonial period to the present. In 1998 I taught a course concerning American History from the colonial period to the Civil War. These classes represented a mix of full-time and continuing education students.

Instructor of History, 8/94-8/95: Held a full-time, one year, non-renewable position as a lecturer in Western Civilization. For the Spring semester I created the course: "War and the Modern State." I also taught in the university's continuing education degree program.
